### Peter's Declaration about Jesus

<sup>27</sup> Jesus and his disciples left Galilee and went up to the villages near Caesarea Philippi. As they were walking along, he asked them, "Who do people say I am?"

<sup>28</sup> "Well," they replied, "some say John the Baptist, some say Elijah, and others say you are one of the other prophets."

<sup>29</sup> Then he asked them, "But who do you say I am?"

Peter replied, "You are the Messiah."

<sup>30</sup> But Jesus warned them not to tell anyone about him.

## Jesus Predicts His Death

<sup>31</sup> Then Jesus began to tell them that the Son of Man must suffer many terrible things and be rejected by the elders, the leading priests, and the teachers of religious law. He would be killed, but three days later he would rise from the dead. <sup>32</sup> As he talked about this openly with his disciples, Peter took him aside and began to reprimand him for saying such things.

<sup>33</sup> Jesus turned around and looked at his disciples, then reprimanded Peter. "Get away from me, Satan!" he said. "You are seeing things merely from a human point of view, not from God's."

Then, calling the crowd to join his disciples, he said, "If any of you wants to be my follower, you must give up your own way, take up your cross, and follow me. <sup>35</sup> If you try to hang on to your life, you will lose it. But if you give up your life for my sake and for the sake of the Good News, you will save it. <sup>36</sup> And what do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul? <sup>37</sup> Is anything worth more than your soul? <sup>38</sup> If anyone is ashamed of me and my message in these adulterous and sinful days, the Son of Man will be ashamed of that person when he returns in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

#### **SERMON**

May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing to you,
O Lord, my rock and my redeemer.

Psalm 19:14

In the past three months, I have lived with diagnosed condition of frozen shoulder on my left one. It includes that my left arm is stiff when I move. Getting dressed is one of difficult things at the moment. After suffering many weeks, I went to see my doctor and then had Xray and ultrasound test. Then what my doctor recommended is to have medication and to keep doing gentle exercise. I needed to accept it. And now I am trying to take this change as part of my life's journey. I have frozen shoulder. The frozen shoulder is mine, which I should bear the rest of my life.

Then I shared my reflection on living with frozen shoulder with my parents in Korea, saying, "Mom, Dad, I am turning into a big season of losing my physical competence but gaining deeper understanding of how you two were feeling when you had frozen shoulders." With my deep sorry for them, I expressed what I felt at that time after hearing of the result. I had never

understood how they might feel when they were growing older, getting weaker and facing all the crisis in life including parenting of two young adult children and their latter retirement. I wondered whether they expressed wisely and relevantly as they suffered from all physical and emotional challenges? Who was there for them to give guidance and wisdom as passing through the tough time in life? At my age of 45 years and 10 months, I would be able to understand that my parents did so well to my sister and me, and to their Lord Jesus Christ during their crisis. The frozen shoulder and its related changes have reminded me of my parents, who are now their mid 70s. It was worth the time to feel empathy from my parents who I always miss. No one turns back to the past. No turning back. The life goes on. Then today I am becoming a father of three children during this challenging time with COVID-19 and the severe lockdown in Sydney. Where is God in those challenges? How does God respond as the people of God follow the way of Jesus in this time? How would I give life and hope to my children and many in the coming of new season?

Mark's gospel begins with identifying who Jesus from Galilee means for his community. "This is the Good News about Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God." (Mark 1:1) The statement of "Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God" leads both audience in Mark's time and readers like us to the way that Jesus journeyed through. To be honest, in Mark's time, the consequence of following the way of Jesus was for disciples and believers to end up taking up cross and having crucifixion like what their master Jesus received. The way meant for those who heard of the stories of Mark's gospel to live for Christ and then to die as Jesus did. Believing in Jesus the Messiah was living and dying like Jesus. The purpose and the consequence were the same like Jesus, their Lord. I would say that it was a privilege for them to imitate the Messiah while they lived on earth and believed the life everlasting. Huge crowd of Christ's followers admitted commitment to the Son of God and his Lordship so that as results, in the world of Caesar, the followers faced costly political choices. They gave up their lives for the faith in Christ instead of compromising between God and Caesar. Though they didn't understand fully where the will of God was, they went to the max for Jesus Christ. Where was God on their suffering way to follow? How did God respond as the people of God followed the way of the cross? What should we learn from them?

When Peter declared that Jesus is the Messiah, his correct answer to the question was silenced. In Jesus muting himself, he was concerned by Peter not because he wanted a good position in Jesus' reign, but because he didn't understand what it means to say like that. To Jesus, discipleship is about the way of the cross. Saying "You are the Messiah" meant to disobey the emperor and all authorities in Judea including religious leaders. And saying "You are the Messiah" follows repentance, self-denial and judgement which are not familiar concepts for all authorities. It was a subversive title. In Jesus' silence, he would rather invite widows, orphans, tax collectors, the poor, the sick and the marginalised and make them be part of the kingdom that he brought into their lives. Jesus blessed those who were less fortunate and gave them the ownership of the kingdom of God. In Jesus' eyes and heart, there was only place for those suffering from the world standards and values. Matthew 11:28-30 clearly speaks, "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you. Let me teach you, because I am humble and gentle at heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy to bear, and the burden I give you is light." I believe that this moment Jesus Christ calls us to come to him and bear his yoke in God's point of view, not human's.

In verse 34, Jesus invites all audience and readers to answer by adding one's name in that sentence. "If any of you [Your name] wants to be my follower, you must give up your own way, take up your cross, and follow me." Jesus' use of 'any of you' functions as an appeal to us as if there is a blank space we are challenged to fill in with our names. Mark created an interactive story here. Would you like to fill in with your name and then complete the sentence? Here, the cross is not a religious icon hung on the church wall and "taking up your cross" is not for personal anguish. To follow Jesus Christ is

to respond God's call to live life that we find anew in Jesus and to make our neighbours experience the life in our sharing love, a radical love that Jesus taught and acted.

In verse 34, the call of Jesus is for us a call to walk in a path of subversive love that challenges oppressive power in this pandemic era, which allows us to assume others instead of to welcome no matter what. This can lead us to danger because we live out this call in the midst of overwhelming forces of self-interests and discrimination.

In verse 35, Jesus invites again to fill in with our name. "If you [Your name] give up your life for my sake and for the sake of the Good News, you will save it." Can you do that? To be honest, I am hesitating now to fill in with my name. I have had much possession in this life including family and ministry, so that I cannot easily fill in. Instead, seriously I am taking it in and being specific of what the possible consequences of my following this path are. What do I most fear? Suffering is presented as a consequence of discipleship. In irony, I pray for discipleship in my life and for many lives.

Remember that Jesus did not call people to walk the path of discipleship alone. But rather to do so in loving community. He lived with all sorts of people and became part of their life stories. People centred to Jesus and he formed a community called the kingdom of God. Man's story was able to be a chapter of God's story. He walked along all the way to each one's place in life in order to give life to their hopeless and meaningless life. He ate with sinners, sharing a heavenly meal and talking with ones who never be welcomed. When Jesus was presented, they were all gathered in the kingdom of God.

Dear my brothers and sisters in Christ, who is the community that is called to be with us on this path? To follow Jesus means not only to walk in his path but also to be in imitate relationship with him and the God who he prayed to. In Jesus, no matter who speaks or mutes, we are embraced by God's compassionate and self-giving love, receiving God's promises and being filled with the Spirit. These are all God's gifts for us. I pray that now as a Christ's community and as an individual we Boronia Park Uniting Church may experience the gifts in our life this day and the days to come.
