BIBLE READING JEAN BOYD

First Reading: Ruth 1:6-18

Naomi and Ruth Return

⁶ Then Naomi heard in Moab that the Lord had blessed his people in Judah by giving them good crops again. So Naomi and her daughters-in-law got ready to leave Moab to return to her homeland. ⁷ With her two daughters-in-law she set out from the place where she had been living, and they took the road that would lead them back to Judah.

⁸ But on the way, Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, "Go back to your mothers' homes. And may the Lord reward you for your kindness to your husbands and to me. ⁹ May the Lord bless you with the security of another marriage." Then she kissed them good-bye, and they all broke down and wept.

10 "No," they said. "We want to go with you to your people."

¹¹ But Naomi replied, "Why should you go on with me? Can I still give birth to other sons who could grow up to be your husbands? ¹² No, my daughters, return to your parents' homes, for I am too old to marry again. And even if it were possible, and I were to get married tonight and bear sons, then what? ¹³ Would you wait for them to grow up and refuse to marry someone

else? No, of course not, my daughters! Things are far more bitter for me than for you, because the Lord himself has raised his fist against me."

¹⁴ And again they wept together, and Orpah kissed her mother-in-law goodbye. But Ruth clung tightly to Naomi. ¹⁵ "Look," Naomi said to her, "your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and to her gods. You should do the same."

¹⁶ But Ruth replied, "Don't ask me to leave you and turn back. Wherever you go, I will go; wherever you live, I will live. Your people will be my people, and your God will be my God. ¹⁷ Wherever you die, I will die, and there I will be buried. May the Lord punish me severely if I allow anything but death to separate us!" ¹⁸ When Naomi saw that Ruth was determined to go with her, she said nothing more.

Gospel Reading: Mark 12:28-34

The Most Important Commandment

²⁸ One of the teachers of religious law was standing there listening to the debate. He realized that Jesus had answered well, so he asked, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?"

²⁹ Jesus replied, "The most important commandment is this: 'Listen, O Israel! The Lord our God is the one and only Lord. ³⁰ And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength.' ³¹ The second is equally important: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' No other commandment is greater than these."

³² The teacher of religious law replied, "Well said, Teacher. You have spoken the truth by saying that there is only one God and no other. ³³ And I know it is important to love him with all my heart and all my understanding and all my strength, and to love my neighbour as myself. This is more

important than to offer all of the burnt offerings and sacrifices required in the law."

³⁴ Realizing how much the man understood, Jesus said to him, "You are not far from the Kingdom of God." And after that, no one dared to ask him any more questions.

SERMON SEUNG JAE YEON

This Sunday, I am leading our congregation's face-to-face worship service which is the first one since last July. I am glad that some of the congregation

members who are fully vaccinated are able to gather together in worship. At the same time, I am holding some of the congregation members in my prayer and thought, who will be able to join in December when the congregation's safety plan allows them freely to join in face-to-face worship. Leading this worship service, I may ask God to bring us all together into his loving and caring presence. I may also ask all of you to withhold our celebration of gathering as whole congregation till Sunday 5 December.

Today, in my sermon sharing, our focus is identity. Who am I? Who are we? What factors shape our identity? What parts of our identity are determined by other people or by society? Identity means purpose, telling each other why we are here. I am not going to talk about our cultural and linguistic identity such as White Anglo Australian, first generation of Korean migrant, speaking of Cantonese or Mandarin etc. We are here today because of God's kingdom identity. Plainly speaking, we are here because of Jesus Christ our Lord who forgives, loves, and calls us. In response, we come and join with each other in this time and space to worship God. So, we can tell that our identity can only be found in Christ.

When one of the scribes asked Jesus about what the greatest commandment is, his answer was the Shema. "Listen, O Israel! The Lord our God is the one and only Lord. And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength." Jesus knows the traditional answer to the question that the scribe asks. The answer is very good to the scribe, but only gets him a half mark in the exam of the kingdom of God that Jesus lives with his people. So, Jesus boldly attaches to the Shema a quotation from Leviticus 19, which is the code of justice and peace. This means that to love God is to refuse to abuse one's neighbour. He says, "Love your neighbour as yourself. No other commandment is greater than these." In Jesus' ministry, the first one and the second one is equally important. Imagine that there was a two-dollar gold coin that has a blank tail or head. Did this coin have only fifty percent

value? Could you use this kind of coin at supermarket? No. Collectors might be interested but no one wants it for their use.

In Jesus' theology of God and this world, faith in God, and justice and peace for neighbours cannot be separated. If one of these commandments — either "Love your God" or "Love your neighbour" is only practised, it would not be determined a half mark. It would be meaningless. Jesus clearly teaches us as well as the scribe, saying, "the Kingdom of God is not far from you." Jesus calls this scribe to join him together to travel to the promised goal in the kingdom, which is Jesus himself. I believe that Jesus calls us now to travel to the promised goal where on the way we may find our identity in him by loving God and neighbour equally.

Yesterday (30 October 2021) my daughter Heather and I had a day trip to Gosford. Our plan was to have a brunch at Brooklyn and then to drive to Gosford to join Sunil Baek's ordination induction service. You may remember Sunil who came to preach upon one Sunday February 2020 when he was a ministry candidate. The lunch we had at Brooklyn satisfied both of us and then cruising on Pacific Highway was just fantastic! Heather and I found more than 10 yellow cars, a pilar of smoke from back burning, and so many trees. On our way home we listened to Heather's number one K-Pop girl group called *TWICE* and their song list. I would like to talk more of topics that we conversed for the duration of our day trip. But I really want to share with you what I learnt from Sunil's ordination induction service at Gosford Uniting Church. I hope you like it.

In the life and witness of the Church, ordination may be one of significant occasions for a person being called and ordained, an ordaining presbytery, and a congregation who calls an ordained minister. The gathered people would anticipate in celebrating God's call in an ordained minister and congratulating each other on their fulfillment in forming a ministry agent for Christ's mission and ministry. I went to join the congregation and solemnly to follow the movement of the Holy Spirit during the service. In

the order of ordination service, there is a section called "The Charge" where the ordaining presbytery delivers the words of what the ordained person should be or can be. Its paragraph 3 clearly talks about how a minister takes care of people in God's love.

Taking Christ the Good Shepherd as your example, you are called to lead God's people in worship, witness and service; to equip them for their ministry and mission; and to work with them in building up the body of Christ. You are called to strive for peace and unity among all Christian people, especially among those with whom you serve.

And then paragraph 6 points out the importance of justice and peace for their neighbours.

You will announce the good news of God in Christ to those beyond the community of faith, stand alongside those who suffer, and work for justice and peace in the world.

In response, Sunil answered all questions by saying, "With God's help, I will." And those who attended the ordination service responded on behalf of the whole church, saying, "Faithful is God, who has called you and who will not fail you." All attendees in the service including Heather and myself might find our identity in Christ, re-affirming what factors shape my identity. Through the service of ordination, we, Uniting Church in Australia have had another ordained minister. In this, we have one more opportunity to find out our identity in Christ Jesus. We are called to love our God and our neighbours, which cannot be separated from each other. And this is our mission that we strive to hold the great commandment and pass it on to the emerging generation in us.

One of the readings today is Ruth. Ruth is one of two books in the Old Testament that are named after two women — Ruth and Esther. Esther was

a Jewish woman, who became the first lady of the Persian empire. In comparison to Esther, Ruth was a foreign woman from Moab who lived in Bethlehem with her mother-in-law Naomi. She lived a lowly life in foreign land, serving and obeying Naomi. But at the end of the book, she became the great grandmother of king David by giving the birth to Obed, the father of Jesse. Then because of this, she became known as part of our Lord Jesus' ancestry.

As I studied about the passage from Ruth, I reflected on Millet's oil painting

"The Gleaners" (picture) that depicts three humble women gleaning a field of stray stalks of wheat after the harvest. What Ruth did in her life in Bethlehem was a few things like gleaning Boaz' fields after the harvest. By doing small and lowly Ruth and her things, name honoured by the Bible and its



readers. Matthew 25:34-36 says, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the creation of the world. For I was hungry, and you fed me. I was thirsty, and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger, and you invited me into your home. I was naked, and you gave me clothing. I was sick, and you cared for me. I was in prison, and you visited me." 'Love your God and love your neighbour' does not require such a huge donation or commitment in ministry. No matter how little that is. If we do it to one of the least of our neighbour, we would fulfil the great commandment in our daily life and be determined by other people as a people of God.

In conclusion, Jesus did not teach this scribe about the strictness of laws in Torah but interpret the great commandment in the centrality of love in the law that all human beings should live for. This story tells us about our identity. Because we, Christian, are determined by other people or by

society that we do not live for the law in the Bible but for the love and justice of the living God with our neighbour. We are here because faith and justice cannot be separated.

Our identity is not commodity that can be exchanged in marketplace. We cannot buy us or our next generation the kingdom identity. Our identity is our integrity that only can be brewed and grow in our heart and our journey together. Jesus' words are encouraging us as we will commit ourselves to living out the great commandment in this coming week. "You are not far from the Kingdom of God."
