¹⁷ When they came down from the mountain, the disciples stood with Jesus on a large, level area, surrounded by many of his followers and by the crowds. Sermon

Your will be done, on earth,
as it is in heaven.

Matthew 6:10

You may have a number of reward and loyalty cards in your wallet. Most major supermarkets have reward card or Flybuys card. And your favourite café may have one like a free coffee after purchasing some drinks. In using them, you can gain points per dollars you spend, and the points of purchase accumulate for your next one to redeem or collect benefits. I do have one loyalty reward card at the local café I drink my coffee. The free drink is always nice and tasty.

How would it look like if we, Christ followers and seekers, have a reward card for heaven or kingdom of God? In our faith, what would be the most important reward to gain? What kind of effort has to be applied in our journey to gain godly reward? Would that be possible to live the reward God prepares for us today? I hope we are able to enjoy God's reward today and the days to come. Of course, in heaven!

Jesus called and appointed the Twelve Apostles on the mountain. Then he came down with them to the plain nearby the sea of Galilee. There they saw huge crowds of people. It would have been impossible to count them all in number and to encounter with all of them in-person! When I was reading this part of the passage, I recalled the moment that I joined thousands of Sudanese Christians hearing a speaker say gospel message in Khartoum in January 2000. The gathering was spectacular so I could not capture by shooting a photo of the gathering in one single photo. Absolutely amazing and unforgettable memory in my youth years! And Acts 1 where Jesus answered, sharing his vision of spreading the good news in and through the power of the Holy Spirit (vv 7-8) came up in my mind.

“The Father alone has the authority to set those dates and times, and they are not for you to know. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.”

Luke, who is the canonised author of the Gospel and Acts of the Apostles, uses the similar imagination of the Holy Spirit and its movement in the midst of believers who were captured by the Word of God. The crowd, followers and the Apostles and Jesus gathered all in the plain and formed the kingdom of God there where all can see and touch the presence of God. Heavenly rewards came down and redeemed their weaknesses and lowliness. The reward from God the Father got them benefits that they never had before joining the fellowship in Jesus Christ. Near the sea of Galilee, where Peter

and his partners caught many fish by following his command, and decided to follow their master Jesus, thousands of the meek and the humble coming from near and far ended up living the heavenly reward that they found in Jesus – his teaching, healing and authority to free people from evil spirit. People marvelled at Jesus who sent in the healing power. Everyone tried to touch him. I believe that Jesus gave him away to be touched by the crowd no matter what matters in life they carried on. We know at the end of Jesus' earthly ministry he gave himself up for them and us upon the old cross to touch many lives that are fragile, broken hearted and lost their way and purpose. Jesus sends in the meaning and purpose in life, touching with the power of Holy Spirit. This is such a great reward that we can only find in Jesus. It was a great moment, and it utterly changed many lives nearby the sea of Galilee.

In the Bible, stories of those whose life was turned upside down comprise many chapters. Noah is one of them. Because of the call from the LORD, he built the ark, a really big boat for 120 years. Noah's ark project was backbreaking work. It needed brain and brawn. But even more than that, it took an incalculable amount of faith to build the ark. He didn't just start building the ark. He gave himself up and obeyed every sign of revelation God gave him. "Noah did everything just as God commanded him." (Genesis 6:22) When the flood finished and the ark settled, the LORD showed him a rainbow, the sign of the holy promise between God and all life on the earth. Noah ran and finished the marathon. Never worried about public opinion. Just lived an act of obedience and gave thanks and praises to the LORD in the clapping of nail-scarred hands. His reward saved his family and all animals in the ark. And because of his reward we can live today with the promise of Jesus Christ that he will come again on earth to fulfil God's will – living whole creation in the love of God. Noah found favour in the eye of the LORD. The favour of God is a goldy reward that opens the door of opportunity in life for us to have faith.

Faith is acting as if God has already answered. Acting as if God has already answered means acting on prayer and sending in the power of prayer for our family, friends, colleagues and neighbourhood. In praying and sending in the power of prayer, we communicate. This is how we, Christ followers and seekers communicate with God and this world. In the power of the Holy Spirit, Jesus' community that gathered nearby the sea of Galilee had the need and dependence on God. Such dependence is the essence of the kingdom of God. I pray that we depend on Jesus' words and deeds as the crowd did the same in the passage. Jesus' community heard him speak about the beauty of blessing within those who live a life that is changed by God. UK theologian N. T. Wright once talks about the Beatitudes, saying, "This ancient Christian vision, Jesus' vision, of human flourishing and of fact that his human flourishing brings God's strange rule to birth on earth as in heaven." (*The Great Story*, retrieved from ntwrightpage.com on 10 Feb) Wright points that the beauty of blessing is not the result of "what God promises to do to someone. It is primarily about what God is going to do through someone." It is so true. God worked through Noah, Jesus, the Apostles, the crowd and in the same way, he will work through us and many. Jesus' teaching in the beatitudes and the woes did not symbolise God's creation divided. In his communication between God and his creation, he wanted to see that each and everyone will be remedied. The poor will own the kingdom of God. The hungry will be satisfied. The sorrow will laugh. They will all receive great heavenly reward. In Jesus' vision, all come freely to communicate with God and with each other. This is a real friendship in communication. In this, our relationship with God is real and our communication with God and each other brings God's will on earth as in heaven. Jesus Christ, our Lord, is the Sign of unity, symbolising the communion of all God's people in him. For this, he came down from heaven, became a servant in human form, defeated the death and rose again for the life everlasting. Where Jesus was, his presence brought the kingdom and utterly changed many lives. Like him, where we are this moment, our faith in Christ may bring peace and unity and gently ask to follow. Our communication with God begins from that moment.

I have witnessed with respect and privilege the dying – both members of the congregation and locals. I can say that this service is the most sacred moment for both a dying and myself, and family members attending. To be honest, all of the dying who I served confessed that they lived a blessed life and were fortunate to have this life with beloved ones and communities including the church. I could notice that their voices were shaking and diminishing but confirming that they lived very well this life especially in the faith of Jesus Christ and the fellowship with other Christians. All looked peaceful and satisfied. Even they talked with me in the sharing of their stories of faith and family that are full of marvellous works of God. They sought to comfort me and family members when I felt fragile. Some held my hand tight without words. Each and every one from my sacred service with the dying they redeemed my weakness before the presence of death and gave me a significant courage to live faithfully God's call in ordained ministry. There I took consolation. And I humbled myself before the greatness of God who lived and worked in that person's entire life. This is reward, a godly reward given by each great person of faith. God would have shown me how I should live each day during my service for the dying. In God's reward, I truly believe that we are equally loved (I will study about *agape* and share with you next Sunday) and encourage each other to extend the benefit of the heavenly reward to many. This is a call from God today. This call may lead us all to a path that we kindly walk a mile together.

I do all this for the sake of the gospel,
that I may share in its blessings.
