The Temptation of Jesus

4 Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, ² where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. ³ The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." ⁴ Jesus answered him, "<u>It is written</u>, **'One does not live by bread alone.'**"

Kids Talk Jenny Keast

What is LENT?

In the Christian church we talk about LENT in the period before EASTER. What does this mean?

LENT is the 40 days before EASTER and it starts with ASH WEDNESDAY – we had a special service here last Wednesday to celebrate the day.

In our Bible reading, we heard about Jesus being in the desert for 40 days preparing for his ministry for God. This 40 day time is what we now call LENT.

It has become a tradition in Christian churches to try and follow Jesus' example and do without something that is important to us, for 40 days. Jesus went without food; that is known as FASTING.

These days, Christians make many choices about what they can sacrifice. On "Songs of Praise", a bishop in England who had over 200 churches to visit, decided he would not use his car but instead ride a bike! He partly did this to help our environment but he agreed it was quite a challenge!

The reason Jesus fasted for 40 days was to use the time to get ready to start teaching people. He was focussing on God so that when those 40 days were over, He would be ready to start doing what God wanted Him to do.

It is not essential to follow a "tradition" during LENT but many people choose to do so. Some people now choose to do something "good" each day as they focus on EASTER.

Serving Jesus should not just happen during LENT but should always be important in our Christian life. Maybe you would choose to "give up" or "give on" during LENT but we thank Jesus for His serious preparation for ministry.

Let us pray:

Father God, we thank you for Jesus' example of how he spent 40 days focussing on you and getting ready to do the mission you gave Him. We pray that you will help us to especially focus on you during these 40 days of LENT so that we'll be ready to service you better and do whatever work you have for us.

In Jesus Name we pray, **Amen.**

Sermon: Seung Jae Yeon

"See, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands." Isaiah 49:16

Let us pray:

Dear God,

We thank you again for your grace. We thank you for the life everlasting on earth and beyond. We thank you for your Son Jesus Christ who is always with us and before us reminding we are all God's people.

In this Lenten journey, help us to deepen our relationship with you more. Help us to root our faith deeply in your Son Jesus Christ.

We pray in Jesus' name. Amen.

I have several fountain pens that I use during my daily office. When I use them, I like the feeling that I write or draw with an ink on a blank paper. It makes me feel like I am a novel writer who dreams of making fortune by my own bestselling books. One of those fountain pens is used when it is a very special occasion like wedding where I need to sign on a formal document. The pen has also my

title and names 'Rev. Seungjae Yeon' engraved on its body. This was a present gifted on my ordination day by one of my best friends years ago. Every time I use it or simply hold it, it makes me feel precious because of my names on it and the texture that the engraved letters touch my fingers or the palm of my writing hand. Sometimes I touch the letters or smooth them



intentionally when I feel that I am out of ideas or brilliant sentences that might have riches of my writing. Rarely, there was a magic moment or eureka moment that I was able to continue paragraphs that I had struggled and then finish it well. I wonder whether my names on the fountain pen are powerful enough to sustain my writing. I imagine what if the fountain pen had Jesus' name engraved and his wonderful name strengthened me and recharged me whenever I smoothed down with my hands. To be honest, I want him most of my days.

Today's scripture reading from Luke 4:1-13 tells us about Jesus who is led by the Holy Spirit in the wilderness. In this story, the key is the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit holds Jesus tight, leading his every footstep toward God's call upon him and God's people who are desperate for him. The Holy Spirit, since his baptism in the Jordan, then led Jesus to move forward God's mission and ministry – the purpose of God.

Jesus was in the state of fullness of the Holy Spirit. He returned from the Jordan river after his baptism by the water and the Spirit. Then he was led by the Holy Spirit in the wilderness, where the Spirit's purposeful intervention only worked for him. In the wilderness, Jesus stood alone with full of the Holy Spirit though he was tested. "In the wilderness" recalls Israel people's wondering time in Exodus or other books in the Old Testament. In the wilderness, they experienced signs of God's absence, in other words, it's called 'temptation'. But, once again, the scripture reading reminds us that there was the Holy Spirit who touched and smoothed down Jesus with the purpose of God. Now let's have look at what happened to Jesus in the wilderness.

Jesus was tested by the devil who had either no name or many names. Then in three challenging and dangerous tests, Jesus fully presented who God is and what God's promises are as the Son of God. And he was also a man who faithfully fulfilled what is written in the Scripture and what the Word speaks to him. Here, we are able to see who Jesus was. He was situated in the wilderness as a lonely man but by his faithfulness to God the Father he went through all tests of earthly temptations that are bread, fame and all desires. What the story tells looks like Jesus defeated the devil's temptations. But look at closely, actually he didn't. Before the mighty God, Jesus humbly obeyed all God's word either written or spoken. Though Jesus is the Son of God, he answers "with the duties of a common man" that are engraved in his heart, soul and mind. Again, in the wilderness, there was the Holy Spirit attending Jesus who kept holding him in the protection and guidance of God. This is Jesus who was called by God not "to stand above all human beings but to live among them." This encourages us when we go through tough times and challenging spaces where we cannot find hope and mercy. However, I truly believe that Jesus lives among us in that time and space. I pray that Jesus is now with you if you are burdened by all worries and frustrations in daily life. Please remember that Jesus, like us, was tested but won by the Word of God. His victory is for all of us. I believe that Jesus, the Son of God leads us always in the way of the Holy Spirit where we would find out a safe place to dwell for our whole being.

During the devil's tests, Jesus responded by saying, "it is written." In verse 4 and 8, Jesus began answering by saying, "It is written." The quotes that he recited are all written in Deuteronomy.

He humbled you by letting you hunger, then by feeding you with manna, with which neither you nor your ancestors were acquainted, in order to make you understand that one does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord. (8:3)

The Lord your God you shall fear; him you shall serve, and by his name alone you shall swear. (6:13)

Jesus didn't rebuke but humbly recited using his memory verses. He didn't forget that the Word is written in the Old Testament that is His Father's

words and promises engraved in his heart and soul. To Jesus, saying "It is written" was his technical and also faithful expression implying the full authority of God. Jesus invited God's will and purpose in him. Because God engraved his Son in his hands. Given that, God has engraved us, in a sense, not just on his hands, but on his heart, for all eternity forever, never ever to be removed.

The devil changed his tactics. He uses the same expression, "It is written." The devil was copying Jesus. Then the devil showed Jesus the particular illusion of Jerusalem and the pinnacle of the temple, and then said this: "For it is written." The devil quoted the word from Psalm 91:11, 12. I guessed here that the devil's quote from the psalm would have disillusioned Jesus. Jesus would have changed the tone and accent of his language like this. (v 12)

Jesus answered him, "It is said, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test."

Jesus revealed truly himself as the Son of God and his Sonship to the world. "It is said" here, in Greek word, *eiretai/ereo* was used in Genesis 1, the Creation story. God created the whole universe not by the written language but by the living Word.

Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God said, "Let there be the sky..." And God said, "Let there be the land and the sea, and the vegetation..." And God said, "Let there be days, years, weathers and seasons..." And God said, "Let there be all water creatures and all birds..." And God said, "Let there be animals of the earth ..." Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our image..."

From the Word of God, all things were made, and by the Word humankind were created. "Jesus was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people." (John 1:2-4) Jesus is the One who can only say like what God says all the time. And the Word of God stands forever when it is said.

The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever. (Isaiah 40:8)

I became an Australian citizen in 2013. I celebrated the citizenship with family and friends just after the citizenship ceremony. Then I had a phone call from my father. He said, "Congratulations on becoming a citizen of Australia that is a country of more opportunity for my son and family there. But I am feeling weird Seungjae. I found that I don't have all names of you – Seungjae, Grace, Joshua, Daniel and Heather anymore on the Resident Registration. I am feeling very weird." In South Korea, that doesn't allow its citizens' dual citizenship, five of us were registered under the name of my father but then removed because we became Australian citizens. I did feel for my dad and his weird emotion because our names on his registration document were like rewards of his own life that he had contributed all. Our names are not written on the document anymore but engraved in his heart and mind. Nothing changes him and separates us from his sincere love for my family in Australia and me.

We just started our Lenten journey. For forty days till Easter day, we are continually called by God to seek to find out the meaning of our relationship with him and his purposeful intervention in our lives. What if we're tempted to think that God has forgotten us, because of the Covid-19, Russia's invasion of Ukraine, or the flood in northern NSW and the Greater Sydney? What if our faith is too little to see hope for tomorrow? Let us remember God's promise that he has put permanent marks on his hands for us. And then boldly proclaim like Jesus who won the testing of devils.

"It is said, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test."

Let us pray:

Dear loving God, thank you for this grace. Thank you for this mercy that we are led by you when we go through tough times.

We thank you Lord for the beautiful reality that we are ever before you, and your will be done through the work of our hands. For forty days in this Lenten journey, especially when we will face all kinds of testings help us to realise that Jesus Christ has won for us showing us how we live not by bread but by your Word. All glory be to your name.

In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
