Acts 11:1-18 (New International Version)

Peter Explains His Actions

- 11 The apostles and the believers throughout Judea heard that the Gentiles also had received the word of God. ² So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him ³ and said, "You went into the house of uncircumcised men and ate with them."
- ⁴ Starting from the beginning, Peter told them the whole story: ⁵ "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. I saw something like a large sheet being let down from heaven by its four corners, and it came down to where I was. ⁶ I looked into it and saw four-footed animals of the earth, wild beasts, reptiles and birds. ⁷ Then I heard a voice telling me, 'Get up, Peter. Kill and eat.'
- ⁸ "I replied, 'Surely not, Lord! Nothing impure or unclean has ever entered my mouth.'
- ⁹ "The voice spoke from heaven a second time, 'Do not call anything impure that God has made clean.' ¹⁰ This happened three times, and then it was all pulled up to heaven again.
- ¹¹ "Right then three men who had been sent to me from Caesarea stopped at the house where I was staying. ¹² The Spirit told me to have no hesitation about going with them. These six brothers also went with me, and we entered the man's house. ¹³ He told us how he had seen an angel appear in his house and say, 'Send to Joppa for Simon who is called Peter. ¹⁴ He will bring you a message through which you and all your household will be saved.'

¹⁵ "As I began to speak, the Holy Spirit came on them as he had come on us at the beginning. ¹⁶ Then I remembered what the Lord had said: 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' ¹⁷ So if God gave them the same gift he gave us who believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I to think that I could stand in God's way?"

¹⁸ When they heard this, they had no further objections and praised God, saying, "So then, even to Gentiles God has granted repentance that leads to life."

Children Young People Talk Jenny Keast

Seungjae has asked me to give a "brief" description of how I came to have faith in Jesus Christ. I hope I can be brief enough! My story to faith in Jesus has been a journey with a series of steps drawing me closer.

I begin by saying that from an early age I always wanted to go to Sunday School and Church. Although my Mum and Dad didn't attend church regularly, they were keen for us to belong to a church. My mum didn't go to church regularly till after my dad passed away, however she participated in many church-based activities. Both my grandmothers were Christians. I think I have five bibles my Mum's mum gave me. We could walk to the nearby Denistone East Methodist Church, so that is where we went. Even when my sisters opted out of Sunday School I was happy to go by myself. When I was young my school friends went there too.

I was fortunate to have three close school friends who were very committed Christians. I know at High School I was reluctant to take the step of "giving my life to Christ" because I had a fear of what that would entail. My friends went to ISCF (Inter School Christian Fellowship, a program run in schools by Scripture Union) but I didn't. I didn't go to Confirmation Classes at an early age but waited until I was sure I was ready to make that commitment. At this stage I was attending the St Andrew's Fellowship group at Eastwood, where Dr Bill Ives was the minister. I recall one night at about age 15 lying in bed thinking for a long time about God and how real was He really. I had been taught that praying was what to do if you wanted to communicate with God. I remember saying to God to please show me if He was real.

I believe from that time (and earlier, I believe) circumstances and people came into my life to show me the reality of God's existence and the personal nature of a relationship with Jesus. I was confirmed at that church when I was in year 12.

While at Teachers' College I had a friend who went regularly to Christian camps run by the Anglican Youth Department. She invited me to go along to help cook. I did this and was really drawn to the camping ministry. I was invited to be a counsellor or group leader at subsequent camps.

At one of these camps, I realised listening to our leader talking in one of the studies about sitting on the fence with God and was challenged to decide whether I was totally "for" Jesus or not.

I believe this was my final decision for Christ. I made the commitment to wholeheartedly follow the Christian life.

When I was appointed to my first teaching position in Picton, New South Wales, I sought out the local Uniting Church and became a member there. I was encouraged and supported by many of the church members and tried to serve as best I could in that church.

Often, it is only in hindsight, that we can see God's leading in our Christian journey. Each of us will have a different story. Ultimately, following Christ is a decision we must make for ourselves. It is a commitment that means making choices every day but I have found God has been ever faithful along sometimes bumpy roads and still I continue to learn new things about my faith journey.

Sermon

"Unity in the Spirit"

As a spiritual care coordinator, I have to write a report every month regarding the residents' spiritual and cultural progress, and also about the work of the pastoral carers and all the volunteers working onsite. In our text this morning there is also someone that made a report and that person's name was Peter. Now you may be asking yourself, "Why did Peter gave that report?" Well, in our reading this morning, it says that the apostles and believers in Judea heard, that the Gentiles had accepted the word of God. So when Peter went to Jerusalem to visit the Apostles, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying "Why did you go and eat together with the uncircumcised?" The reason why they ask Peter this question is because the Judean believers (Jews) did not associate at all with the Gentiles, reason being they had always regarded the Gentiles as unclean people. They were looked upon as a lower class of people. Peter's response was a step by step report of what took place. Peter explains that while he was in Joppa praying,

he saw a vision of a large sheet coming down from heaven being lowered by its four corners as it came close to him. When Peter looked closely he saws four footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. And then he hears a voice saying to him, "Get up Peter, kill and eat." But Peter replied, Oh no Lord, I had never put anything profane and unclean in my mouth. But a second time the voice came from heaven saying, "What God has made clean, you must not call profane." Now, all this happened three times, then everything was pulled up again to heaven. (I just want to stop here for a minute to share some thoughts about Peter's vision.)

Through this vision God was revealing to Peter, about the sheet with four corners, lowered from heaven, which represents the four corners of the world, that the gospel must be preached in every corner of the world as the apostles were commissioned by Jesus in Mathew 28:19, to go and make disciples of all nations baptising them in the name of the Father the Son and the Holy Spirit. Jesus was talking about all nations, all people, not just a particular nation or a particular group. Now the apostles were commencing their mission but the circumcised believers posed a problem and challenge because they were still heavily influenced by the law and its traditions, especially when it comes to segregation between the circumcised believers and the Gentiles (clean and unclean). Peter reports that straight after this vision, three men approached him who sent from Caesarea. Lead by the Spirit, Peter was told not to hesitate, but to go with them. As they entered a man's house whose name was not mentioned, they were told that an angel appeared in his house, and told him to send for Peter who was at Joppa, for Peter has a message that will save him and his household. When Peter began to speak, the Holy Spirit came upon this man and his household just as it had done at the beginning on the day of Pentecost (Acts 10:44-45). In Acts 11:16, says, Peter remembered what the Lord had said concerning baptism,

that, "John baptise with water, but you will be baptised with the Holy Spirit." Baptism in the Holy Spirit is made available to all who believe in Jesus and have repented of their sins. The important message here is not so much of the act of baptism in the water, but it's significance of true repentance. The Holy Spirit is God's free gift that is for those who have fully repented of their sins and have accepted Christ in their lives. One of the main problems in the church is that there are too many man-made rules, that tie down people from becoming Christians. For example, circumcision is no longer required because it was all part of the law, but what really required is the heart, a heart that is fully repented, it's not physical but it's the heart, the heart has to be clean not the body. Well, I'm not saying not to clean your body because it is important to keep your hygiene and look after your body which is the temple of the Holy Spirit.

We can't continue on God's work if we continue to add more laws and rules that will prevent people from coming to Christ. If we continue on holding on to the laws and rules that were made by man, is that mean that what Jesus had already done for us was not sufficient to made everything clean for us? Is that mean that God's plan for salvation in which his son died for was incomplete? But, That's what sets Christianity apart from other religion, is that the work of Christ for all of mankind was completed. The price has already been paid my Jesus' when he died and victoriously rose again, and our part is to repent and accept Jesus to be our Lord and saviour. Even Jesus was criticised for eating with Zacchaeus, Jewish were saying, "Look, he said he is the son of God, but he is dining together with the unclean people." In the Jewish tradition, the Jewish do not eat together or even enter the house of a gentile, because they believe that its unacceptable, and unclean. But, that is the mission, the Christian mission, to take the gospel to the sinners. For example, if you go to a village or a place where there is no water for

baptism, do you wait until there is water in order for that person to be saved and receive their salvation? It's all about the Holy Spirit of God, we can be baptised without water, but we cannot be baptised without the Holy Spirit. The importance of the Holy Spirit, that even in ministry and proclaiming the Gospel you cannot do it by your own strength or knowledge, Only by the Holy Spirit are you able to carry out your calling. The Holy Spirit equips you, enables you, teaches you and provides you with the strength that you need to do the work of God. By the power of the Holy Spirit, you are able to do all things. Don't depend or rely on your tradition or law to help you. The peace of God you will receive when you rely on the Holy Spirit. There is only one unforgiving sin, and that is to sin against the Holy Spirit. Because when you think about it, "Who is the Holy Spirit?" Holy Spirit is God! So sinning against the Holy Spirit is sinning against God. No matter what kind of sin you commit it can be forgiven, except sinning against the Holy Spirit. There are Christians who don't want others to be saved or to receive the gift of salvation, it is sad, but it's true, and it is still happening nowadays. The Holy Spirit is available to all who repent and call on the name of Jesus. The text in Acts 11:9 speaks of what God has cleansed you cannot call impure or profane. The saving act of Jesus on the cross at Calvary was done so that forgiveness is made available for everyone who decided to give their life to Christ and asks to be forgiven. At the conclusion of Peter's report in verse 17, Peter makes it quite clear for all that the events which took place at Joppa, was all part of God's divine plan with the Holy Spirit connecting the two, the Gentiles and the circumcised believers or the Jews, as one. No more segregation or separation within the family of God for we are all united as one body of the church in our faith and in our love for the Lord. This is what Jesus was talking about in John 13:34 "A new command I give you, love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." There is to be no more division within the body of Christ, whether you're a Jewish or a Gentile, whether you're black or white, male or female, we are all one family united in our faith and in our love, not just for one another, but in Christ alone. In Jesus' powerful name, Amen.
