Minister's Sharing of a Reflection on Hebrews' Reading: Jesus, Founder and Perfecter of Faith

Last Sunday I talked about faith and a faithful commitment of Abraham and Sarah, which is their journey toward the land that God promised. Hebrews 11, the whole chapter is all about faith and the confidence found in faith. So it's called the "Hall of Faith." It is followed by the stories of many men and women in the bible who had faith in God and by faith they pleased God, showing their faith by encouraging others to continue to live by their own practice of faith. By faith, Abraham obeyed and Sarah received power to conceive. By faith, Isaac prayed for future blessings on his twin sons, Jacob and Esau. By faith, Jacob blessed each son of Joseph. By faith, Joseph, made mention of the exodus. By faith, Moses left Egypt. By faith the Israelites crossed the Red Sea. By faith, the wall of Jericho fell down. By faith, Gideon, Samson, David and Samuel, and prophets did all God's work, enduring all struggles and challenges so that they were made strong out of

weakness. Who else we can list more names? Hebrews 11 talks about our ancestors of faith who at once prefigured Jesus Christ, our Saviour and the Son of God. The story of our ancestors of faith may help us recall our own baptism, confirmation, ordination and our own faith ancestors. And the story of faithful people reminds us of the importance of faith that we live today.

Last Sunday, just before the worship service, I was given a business card from Lorraine. This was her response to my request which I asked her to get her contact details. Such a nice and respectful response to me. Anyway, I kept it well and then later saved the detail in my phone and computer. Done. Then I had found a very interesting section on the card. It says, "SURNAMES I'M RESEARCHING: Crossman, King, Parker, Ronaldson, Schieler, Small, Stokes, Taylor." Some are familiar and some not. I wondered what made her to research about those English-European surnames. If you know anyone in your circle of life who has one of those surnames, please let me know. I will pass it onto her as soon as possible. Let us give her opportunity and help to make her work in progress!

Having had my wondering moment on the business card, I ended up thinking of where my surname YEON came from. What I have learned is that the Surname YEON has its origin in *Henan*, China. During the Yuan dynasty of China (the Mongol Empire) our ancestor, SU CHANG YEON was a public servant of the imperial family of *Kublai Khan*, the founder of the Dynasty. Here I assume that my ancestors could have come from Mongolia because they served the royal of Mongol Empire. Anyway, he became join the diplomatic mission that was given such a huge task to escort the first daughter of *Kublai*, called the supreme princess, *Qutlugh Kelmysh*. She was the great-grand daughter of *Genghis Khan*. Because of Yuan overlordship of *Koryo* dynasty, she became the first Mongol queen consort in the history of ancient Korea.

Finally, the diplomatic mission and himself arrived safely with the supreme princess and completed their mission in 1275. Then a new journey began from there. Our ancestor SU CHANG decided to remain in the Korean Peninsula. I don't know whether his settlement in Korea was part of the mission or a huge reward from the princess. He was received a territory in *Goksan*, near the capital territory of *Koryo*, *Gaeseong*. He became a lord. It happened more than 700 years ago that my ancestors immigrated from *Henan*, China to *Goksan* in the Korean Peninsula. I wonder whether he would have tempted to go back home where the rest of his YEON family and friends. I wonder his DNA of leaving home and living in a foreign land might remain in me. So as a result, I live in Australia, journeying through this land as

immigrant and missing sometimes my motherland, South Korea. Have you ever traced your family's history on an ancestry website or heard the ancestry from your parents or grandparents? What about your surname and its origin? I believe that your surname may contain all the richness of your ancestry and the story of family's faith, no matter where you come from. With my whole self and absolute respect, I honour your name that has its origin or founder who had the surname in the beginning of ancestry. Hebrews 12:1-3 describes Jesus Christ, our Saviour, as Founder and Perfecter of our faith. It's amazing, isn't it? We, Christians, have the story of faith that has its first chapter, the first paragraph and the first line, Jesus Christ. By faith, we live and believe in Jesus Christ, Founder and Perfecter of our faith.

In the Bible, both the Old Testament and the New Testament, there are tons of names. Some are well known to its readers. Adam and Eve, Joseph and Moses, David and Goliath, Ruth and Esther, Daniel and Isaiah, Mark, Matthew, Luke and John, Peter, Paul and Timothy, Anna and Phoebe. And Jesus of Nazareth, who became lowered and humbled for us to give life everlasting in God. Which bible character you can recall when it comes to all men and women in the bible? According to the Biographical Bible, the second edition, there are 3,237 Bible characters named in the Scripture. And the people of faith whom you have known could be included in them.

If I choose one of them in the Bible, Stephen, one of early church's leaders would come first in my mind. He preached the gospel message to all believers and people without faith in Christ, then as the result he was killed by stoning. He testified of the truth with confidence and what he said angered the people enough to kill him. (Acts 6-7) This story is embedded in me because the story of his preaching and persecution always reminds me of the call that I have lived with. It makes me always humble and obey God. And it always reminds me of Who Jesus Christ is and his proclamation of good news, what makes all things upside down. Like Heaven on earth, God in human form, sitting and eating with sinners, walking a mile with enemies, turning the other cheek for the enemy to slap. And finally died upon a cross but rose again from the dead. All that he said and did was paradoxical! I believe that I am called to follow Christ not only in the same way that he demonstrated but also in the same conclusion, which may mean I would be suffered because of my faith and commitment in ministry. Apostle Paul said, "The Holy Spirit testifies to me in every city that imprisonment and persecutions are waiting for me." (Acts 20:23) By faith, Stephen lived out God's will and by faith, apostle Paul bore all pains and agonies. God's help and faith in Christ sustained him while he worked for the good news of Jesus Christ. From Abraham, the father of faith, to Jesus Christ, all those who believe in God and follow God's promises are with us as witnesses like a cloud. This is what the Bible tells us. This is what we are called to be. By faith, we may become someone's founder of faith and perfecter of faith like Stephen and apostle Paul. I wonder what it means to become a founder and a perfecter of faith in life?

Hebrews 12:2 describes Jesus as the Founder(ἀρχηγὸν, archegon) and Perfecter(τελειωτήν, teleioten). The first word also means leader, but the concept is one of someone who not only leads, but also has created the opportunity for us to follow. Sometimes the word is translated "author." It is similar to the word "cause" or "source" in Hebrews 5:9. It says, "And, once made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him." (New International Version). So he started the journey and prepared it for us. Hebrews 6:20 speaks of him as the "forerunner." "Where our forerunner, Jesus, has entered on our behalf. He has become a high priest forever ..." (NIV) The second word can be translated "finisher", meaning that he started the course and he finished the course. But it can also mean that he not only finished the course himself, but helps others to complete the journey by praying for them. Jesus, Founder and Perfecter of our faith, set it up the way and he can bring us to its goal, as well as having completed the journey himself and for us. Despite the joy which lay before him, holding it in mind, he was prepared to endure all kinds of suffering for all who believe in him. Then by faith we don't grow weary. By faith we can look to Christ when especially time is tough.

Looking to Jesus is an inspiring theme. Again, I would say that we are not escaping to another world by faith. Instead, he encourages us to go together through this world as companions of faith journey and join him in another place and another time. His calling isn't "Christian, follow me,' but "Brothers and sisters, don't be afraid," setting us on that way and helping us get there, because he has been along that road, and still journeys through it. Jesus is the Founder and Perfecter of our faith journey. Let us run with endurance the race where we could provide opportunity for others to follow Jesus. And we are called to become helpers for others to complete their journey. This is our ministry, our mission and our commitment here at Boronia Park Uniting Church and wherever we go in this coming week.

Romans 1:1 says, "Paul, a bondservant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, separated to the gospel of God." (New King James Version) When Paul describes himself as a "servant" ($\delta o \tilde{\nu} \lambda o \zeta$, *doulos*) of Jesus Christ, he confesses, perhaps, saying, "Jesus Christ is the owner of my life and I submit

unconditionally to Christ, to rely on and dedicate myself to Christ alone." Then he lived out the call as founder and perfecter of faith for early Christians and the faith communities in the Roman Empire. And even today his teaching and mission trips written in the New Testament are a great source for many Christians in order to provide opportunity to find Christ and to help them to complete their own endurance of cross.

In this coming week, I want us to commit ourselves to giving opportunity to those who desperately find meaning in life. Simply you may offer your listening ears and compassionate heart for them. Don't need to say many words. Just listen and pay your whole attention to them in presence or over the phone. Like a servant, sit and attend. And this coming week, let us become encouragers for our children, friends, and colleagues. Help them to complete their faith journey no matter how it looks like by prayers and thoughts. Which thing in this world is greater than the faith in Christ we have? By faith, we can live. By faith we can share the life of Jesus Christ with many and they may live in Jesus, Founder and Perfecter of faith.

Prayers of the People

August 15 is Liberation Day in both South and North Korea, marking the date in 1945 when Korea gained independence from Japanese colonial oppression after 36 years.

Sadly and ironically, the year 1945 also marks the year Korea divided into two countries by the foreign powers instead of building a self-determined independent country like the one that the Korean people had lived in for more than 5,000 years. Then Korean War broke out on Sunday 25 June 1950. Since the War and the armistice, the Korean Peninsula and her peoples and the Korean Diaspora have lived out the great pain of division, generation after generation.

Each year, the World Council of Churches and the World Communion of Reformed Churches call member churches to pray for peace and unity in Korea, and peaceful reunification of the Korean Peninsula. This is usually on the Sunday before 15th August each year.

Rev Seung Jae Yeon reflects:

"In recent years, we Koreans have been concerned about the international situation amongst countries around the Korean Peninsula and the rising of neo-

colonialism in the Pacific. What we learned from the past is that we would act for peace as a mediator, so that we might create harmony and reconciliation in that situation rather than ride on crisis as a player in that power game. We believe that at this time of the year, as we celebrate Liberation Day and remember our past, we are called by each other to bring an end to division locally, and call on the name of God, *Hana-Nim Abu-Ji* (meaning 'Heavenly Father' in Korean) who can only bring the wave of reconciliation and reunification in the world as well as in the Peninsula. We commit ourselves to making peace because we Korean people are known as a people who love harmony and unity, respect all humanity and do good for others in the neighbourhood."

Prayer points

- 1. Peaceful, considerate, mindful leadership and co-operation across the Korean Peninsula and in the Pacific.
- 2. A renewed will for humanitarian cooperation, reconciliation and sustainable reunification.
- 3. Strengthen Korean Christians in the Peninsula and all around the world/Australia as they deal with complex and often difficult situations.
- 4. Uphold the people in the Korean Peninsula especially those who are affected by the extreme flooding. (8 August-Present)

We praise you for your promise of renewal throughout the cosmos.

We grieve alongside those who are mourning, and we share the anguish of the many –
North Korean refugees, families separated by the war – who are anxious for their loved ones across the border.
We yearn for your comfort, healing and hope for all who are sick and suffering.

Grant an extra measure of your strength and sustenance to the people of North Korea and to all those who would come to their aid, bringing them vaccines, other medical supplies and basic food supplies as well.

We cry out against the inaction that entrenches inequality;
We cry out against the vested interests that entrench systemic violence.
We cry, come, Holy Spirit.

Come, Holy Spirit, bring your liberation and Gwang-bok[^] to the Korean peninsula and to the whole cosmos.

Move us to live out your unity in witness to the world.

In Christ's name we pray.

[^] After long suffering under the colonial invasion of Japan for 36 years, as a result of the end of World War II in Asia-Pacific, the people and the land of Korea were liberated on 15 August in 1945. The National Liberation of Korea is called gwang-bok. The word "gwang-bok" means "restoration of light".
